The Pastel Artists Canada was founded in 1989 by a small group of artists in the Burlington area. Its membership has since grown to 200 artists. Known previously as Pastel Artists of Ontario, Canada, the name was changed May of 2003 to reflect our diverse membership.

To promote public appreciation of Art in Soft Pastel and to improve the skills of artists working in this fine art medium.

A Little Piece of Pastel Artists' History

Lillian Hayter PAC retired from PAC this year. She was a founding member and wishes us well. While cleaning out files, she came across the first letter sent out by Enid Reid and Don Hamilton inviting interested pastelists to an informal get-together at the Burlington Culture Centre (now the Burlington Art Centre); it was dated April 26, 1989. Over tea, coffee and goodies the first seed of our association was planted. The seed was well tended by a growing number of enthusiasts with **Don Hamilton** and **Ursula Reese** becoming co-founders of Pastel Artists of Ontario. Ursula later became the first President of PAO. On August 4 to 12, 1990 at the Chapel Gallery in Bracebridge, The Right Touch, the first Annual Pastel Exhibit was presented. Elene Freer acted as Curator. Membership was \$10 and the show fee \$15. Lillian sent along an early newsletter as well from 1993, the editor was Ursula Reese. In the Tips section there were two recipes for fixatives and one for a pastel eraser.* Thank you Lillian for your thoughtfulness.



Mini-bios.....

Mary Douglas started drawing and painting with pastels thirteen years ago while she was working as a traveling nurse in the USA. On days Mary was not working, she and her husband Phil, who is an oil painter, would go out sketching. Mary says, "Phil has been a great mentor and teacher". Five years ago, they returned to Canada and bought a house in the country, near Pembroke. They continue to learn while experiencing the joy of painting. Thirteen months ago **Ken (Sparky) MacKenzie**, had an overwhelming desire to express those things that were important to him, through the medium of pastel. Namely; how we experience our environment through design and architecture, both here and abroad. How does our personal passage impact and change our view of the world emotionally, visually and mentally? Sparky says his painting *April Fair Seville* (see back cover) is one small example of his experience of the April Spring Fair held each year in Seville, Spain. During this time, beautiful Seville is transformed. Each day, men elegantly dressed in 19th century attire, drive open carriages filled with mantilla crowned ladies through its streets. It is a time for singing, Flamenco dancing and all-night partying.

Melissa Schatzmann is a self-taught artist who has been drawing and painting portraits for as long as she can remember. She began using pastel to paint portraits in 2003 and immediately fell in love with the medium. Her work has been displayed in many fairs, festivals, studio tours and solo exhibits. One of her pencil and stippling portraits was published in a grade 11philosophy book, published by McGraw-Hill Ryerson. Her work has been commissioned throughout North America and as far away as Europe. Melissa has been teaching portraiture, animal, landscape and still life drawing and pencil techniques to both adult and children for the past five years. She is now offering an online pencil drawing course. Melissa has spent the past seventeen years as a professional graphic artist and website designer and also instructs graphic

and website design at a local college. Much attention is given to fine detail when Melissa draws and paints her portraits. The high level of her work has been achieved by hard work, determination and a passion for art and creativity. She hopes to continue to experiment with painting in pastel. Gail Sibley has worked in pastels for about ten years. She was born and raised in Jamaica and now resides on Salt Spring Island in British Columbia. Gail received her BFA from the University of Manitoba and her MA in Art History from Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario. In 2002, she was thrilled to achieve Signature membership in the Pastel Society of America. Here in Canada, the Federation of Canadian Artists awards signature status only to those individuals who have been accepted into a minimum of eight FCA juried shows within four years. Accreditation is then awarded following a portfolio jury of recent works. Gail achieved this signature status within one year. She has participated in a number of shows, most recently: A Sibley Affair Act II, at the Kennedy Gallery in Grand Cayman, and Passion for Pastels, at the Federation Gallery on Granville Island, Vancouver. One of Gail's pastels was accepted into the last bi-annual exhibition of the International Association of Pastel Artists. Her work is in private and corporate collections worldwide and has been featured in the Master Pastelists of the World section of International Artist Magazine. Marie Jeanne Leccisi Newbery was born in Montreal and grew up in Rome. Back in Montreal she attended l'ecole de Beaux Arts and one of her instructors was Arthur Lismer. Others of note were Reinblatt, Cosgrove and J.deTonnancour. The first medium she experimented with was soft pastel and she still enjoys the freedom and the speed it allows the artist at work. To-day in her own studio in Brampton she works in oils and builds sculptures using clay. Of the solo exhibitions she had, one stands out: held in Via Margutta in Rome, it was organized with the support of the Canadian Cultural Institute; many pastels and oils were sold. Marie Jeanne has many plans, some travel and more shows, always including figures, faces and flowers and of course, some of them or maybe all of them using pastels. Sharing Pastel Info......

Have you thought of making colour reproductions of your pastel paintings?

Here is how Mary Douglas makes extremely accurate, inexpensive and professional-looking reproductions of her work to show to galleries and people who ask to see samples of her artwork.

Most business supply companies have one or more colour copiers that are capable of producing copies that are faithful to the original work. This is particularly useful to pastel artists who do not want their work handled by inexperienced people. Making copies of your work has several features which are very useful and very little pastel dust transfers to the copier glass and it is very easily wiped off with a clean cloth.

- 1. The image can be reduced or blown up and centered or off-centered on the paper to make posters or cards.
- The colour can be adjusted in some of the better machines for accuracy or for effect.
- 3. The lightness or darkness of the copy can be adjusted.
- 4. Any reproduction less than the paper size has a white border around it which can be adjusted. The original can be cropped for a better composition.
- 5. There are various qualities and types of paper available. I use a cheaper quality for the first tries while I am deciding on the intensity, border, etc., then use glossy card stock and/or coated papers for my finished copy.
- 6. The price per copy is very reasonable: \$1.50 to \$3.75.
- 7. The one down-side to this process is that only smaller works can be easily done and only those pieces that fit on 8 1/2" x 11" or 11" x 17" papers.

To make copies of my work I use *The Copy House* and sometimes *Staples*, in Pembroke where I live.

Getting technical with digital images. Rosemary Simpson tries to simplify digital images for us.

The popularity of digital cameras has grown into a tidal wave in the last few years. If you have one you know how economical it can be. No more waiting until the roll of film is finished, you can download the images you want as soon as you wish. Your camera store can transfer the lot onto a CD or you can make your own CD. You can decide on the type of paper and the size of the final product, share photos with family and friends via the internet. No worries about an intrusive background, just crop it out.

The quality of digital cameras has risen while the price has dropped, an inviting solution for recording your work. Many artists are already taking advantage of digital technology by including a CD as part of their proposals to galleries.

No, don't cheer yet. Slides are still the acceptable way to go. Most calls for entry into juried shows still insist on slides, as do most galleries. Many galleries do not have the equipment to run CD presentations or computers that can download high quality digital images quickly, they usually all have the means to view slides.

The ease of emailing photos/images is one of the most popular uses for a digital camera. Our web site manager loves to get images this way as he knows that the artists have sent the truest representation of their work. However, if digital images are not available to you, do not let that stop you from participating in the PAC Online Gallery. Tim Daniels who administrates web participation will be very happy to scan slides or photos for you.

Digital Vocabulary

Jpegs = a graphic file.

All computer files have what we call extensions, i.e. say you sent a picture called: Flowers.jpeg. Flowers is the name assigned and .jpeg is the extension describing the type of file. A .jpeg is a graphic file that is interchangeable with any type of computer. Mac and PC computers do not like to talk to each other (blame Bill Gates) but they do exchange .jpeg files. Jpegs are the type of files that we use for the images you see in the PAC website galleries.

Resolution = quality/size of file/dimensions.

You can set digital cameras to capture a high, medium or low resolution; the lower the setting, the lower the quality of the image and visa versa. If you are taking pictures of your work as a record then you will want the middle setting for quality. Images taken at the highest resolution will take a lot of memory and quickly use up the space in your camera. Files of this size also take a long time to download onto a computer.

Pixels = dots that make up a digital image.

Dpi/ppi = dots per inch/pixels per inch. The higher dots per inch the better quality im

The higher dots per inch the better quality image but the larger the chunk of memory needed. You have to decide what your purpose is.

Printing: A higher resolution of between 200 to 300 dpi is needed for a quality result on paper. Size and resolution are related but the computer looks at "on screen resolution" differently than a printer. The photo editing program that comes with your camera helps you edit your pictures and prepare them for different purposes.

On-screen use: (Website and email). A lower resolution is fine and will download faster, typically 75 dpi. For the PAC web site we prefer at least 100 dpi to allow for working with the image. We post images of horizontal orientation at a width of no more that 450 pixels and images of vertical orientation at no more that 370 pixels. These sizes fit into our display format. The less the web master has to play with the images the truer they remain to the originals sent. If you are scanning images for web posting, use these guidelines.

Hint: Keep an original digital copy. Why?

As you work with a .jpeg file and resave your results for different purposes, pixels are lost. Every time you work with a .jpeg file and resave to the same file name you lose some pixels, lowering the quality of the image. After a while, the picture of your work begins to look fuzzy and dull. Work with a copy of your original file when editing.

A good reference book is *Digital Photography for Dummies*, riveting bedtime reading. Keep the camera manual handy.

Here is a nice bit of news. Camera stores who provide a variety of quality processing services are now beginning to offer digital-to-slide conversion. PAC has been exploring the idea of having a juried web show in the near future.

A digital camera is not only an investment in dollars but in time. Once into it most people are hooked.

Go nuts!

Pastel Eraser, Cheap and Available. (from a 1993 member newsletter)

No, don't toast it! "Fresh White Bread is just about ideal for pastel as well as answer-

ing those mid-session hunger pangs. Just eat the crusts and wad little pieces of one inch square of very fresh white bread and scrub away. Work along the line not across. Replace bread frequently. Bread leaves very little surface pastel behind, doesn't smudge and is cheap as well." (2004 - We do not recommend the use of this eraser on sanded paper.)

Some tips picked-up from Pam Carter's Workshop......

• Always start with thumbnails. Lots of them, both horizontal & vertical on a sheet of newsprint. One of these will become your map to the Still Life in front of you.



Decisions, decisions, decisions. Karen Leslie Hall - which thumbnail to use.

- Use only thick <u>vine</u> charcoal. Pam always uses the side of her charcoal to mass in form, rather than to draw outlines. Pam calls this her "cloud approach" to drawing.
- Put frame around your paper (approx. 1") & using Pam's cloud approach make a solid foundation in charcoal before using colour.
- The negative spaces are important. Push the negative space to sculpt the objects, rather than drawing them in.

- Try not to think of the objects by name but by shape.
- Start in the middle of the picture & what stays in, stays in & what goes out at the edges, goes out.
- Using hard pastels, lightly apply colour all over the canvas, working with the values. Taltine, mineral spirits, or drug store rubbing alcohol can be used to reinforce the dark colours.
- Put suggestions of patterns. Do not cover your canvas with background colour then add decorations.
- Place your canvas so that when you look into the middle of the canvas – let us say that is 12 o'clock your subject should

be at either 11:00 or 1:00. You should not have to turn your head to see your subject.

- The whole painting should stay in the same degree of focus until the very last stage. Do not overwork or finish one area at a time, look at the overall effect.
- Only allow five minutes to add the finishing touches and to punch up the colour. Over-working kills the creativity.
- Use pastel pencils to soften edges or blend colour. Do not use them for drawing.

Tim Daniels writes: Forever Young in Mexico

On a recent trip to Mexico, my wife Ginny and I visited Ajijic, a small (pop. 15,000 or so) town located on the north shore of Lake Chapala, which is an hour south of Guadalahara. The weather here for much of the year is like a perfect day in June. Needless to say, the area has long been a favourite of snowbirds, retirees and others who just want to escape the extremes of Canadian weather. The reasonable cost of living does not hurt either. Someone who has known about this place for a long time is PAC member **Eldora Taylor**. She and her husband Ray have been spending their winters here for eight or nine years. In Ajijic we heard about an art

show on the grounds of Hotel Real Chapala and guessed, accurately, that we would find Eldora there. Ginny, who had never met Eldora, was struck by her energy, humour and genuine affection for the Mexican people, especially the children. After giving us a few tips about things to do in the area, she invited us to visit one of her Saturday morning children's art classes at the Lake Chapala Society, a volunteer civic organization made up of expatriate Canadians and Americans. As well as run-

ning an extensive range of social events and activities, the Society does a great deal for local children. Saturday morning art classes are heavily attended by kids ranging in age from 5 to 16. The day we visited, there were about 50 children in attendance, many of them buzzing around Eldora, their affection for her transcending any language barriers. She introduced us to one of the volunteers, a Mexican guy, about 30 years old who, inspired by these classes as a kid, had gone on to study art in San Francisco and become a successful printmaker and gallery owner. Eldora has a very full schedule. Along with her teaching, she paints almost every day, working from models and the landscape. Occasionally she finds time for a game of golf or a trip to the theatre in Guadalahara. When I think of Eldora, I cannot help thinking of Bob Dylan's song, **Forever Young.**

Ann Walsh writes: Jessie Grant, Gloria Burgoin and I took a course this Winter called Urban Landscape, put on by the Dundas Valley School of Art. One of the locations was the Siemens - Westinghouse factory in Hamilton. We were lucky

to be able to paint right in the factory - both on the floor and up on a catwalk - for a bird's eye view. As part of their 100th Anniversary, the company said they would buy one painting from the twenty or so paintings that were completed in the two days we all were there. The workers would vote for their favourites. The company liked all the work so much, they pledged to buy six paintings instead of one. Cheers for the pastel painters! Four pastels were purchased and two oils; Jessie's **Great Gears**, Gloria's **Turbine** and my **Rotor** and **Show Time**. All these works are now in The Siemens-Westinghouse Collection

News just in: Ann's painting, Rotor is being sent to Siemens-Westinghouse's head office in Germany and will be in their collection. Congratulations Ann! (Watch for Ann's painting on the next newsletter cover.)

And now a cry for help from Eldora Taylor:

I am asking the members of PAC how they deal with requests for donations of their paintings. Living in a small town, I am asked by every service club and fund raiser for a painting. To add insult to injury, sometimes I am asked to purchase a ticket to go and see my painting auctioned. I am at the saturation point - does anyone have a polite plan of refusal? A person told me he donates one free painting per year and to the others his reply is OK but it is 60/40 - I get the 60%. I would like to hear from you. Pam Carter's Workshop - April 3 and 4, 2004 **Great Fun, Great Demos and Instruction**

Everyone agreed the Burlington Art Centre was a great spot for a workshop. Nelson and Merle of Shoreline Café in the Centre spoiled us with fresh-baked cinnamon buns, muffins, coffee and pre-ordered lunches over the two days.



Saturday morning was cold and gray but inside the studio Pam was busy arranging bright yellow sunflowers, fresh spring tulips, daffodils & iris into six stilllife arrangements. Pam's infectious enthusiasm and the brightly coloured flowers warmed our spirits and we were ready to paint. Pam demonstrated how she

approaches still-life. First, using thick vine charcoal, a few small quick sketches of different orientation. After consideration and exploration, a selection, then on to the paper.

In this demo, Sabertooth (known as St.Armand in Montreal). Still using thick vine charcoal, Pam establishes the under drawing.



After removing excess dust. she then worked in colour. starting with hard pastel and moving on to the softer pastels. Continually working with values to final comple-

tion. After a full day of instruction and painting, the group drove to Rosemary's for dinner and relaxation. By 8:30 we all had eaten a delicious meal and had talked ourselves into silence. It was a tired group that departed from Rosemary's to sleep & refresh ourselves for another day with Pam. Sunday morning Pam showed us what she calls "Pam's cheap &



dirty". This is using acrylic & water as a under-painting. For this demonstration Pam used colorfix paper. Everyone chose a different still-life set-up & tried to remember all Pam's instructions & tips. Pam's enthusiasm, vitality and humour infected everyone. Pam, it was a fun workshop, thank you.


